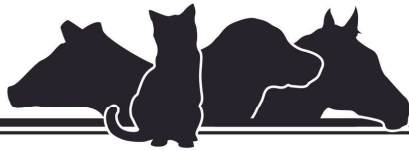

Managing Your Goats Deworming Protocol

Parasite management is one of the most critical aspects of sheep and goat herd health. As the weather warms up, parasite reproduction ramps up and the worm burden your livestock carry can increase. A strong parasite management program centers around appropriate deworming strategies. In North America, the worm population, especially the Barber Pole Worm, is resistant to many of the traditional deworming products. Because of this level of resistance, blanket deworming every animal in the group is not recommended. Instead it is recommended to assess the body condition score and level of anemia of each animal individually. Anemia severity can be determined using the FAMACHA score, which looks at the mucus membranes of the eye. The brighter pink in color, the lower the level of anemia. FAMACHA score should be interpreted along with the animal's body condition score, or level of fat coverage. Animals with low body condition scores and pale mucus membranes should receive deworming treatment. Getting your herd on a regular herd health schedule is a great way to start refining your parasite management strategies. At a herd health visit, we can help assess the group's parasite burden, vaccinate, and answer all of your herd health related questions. We are also happy to teach you these skills! 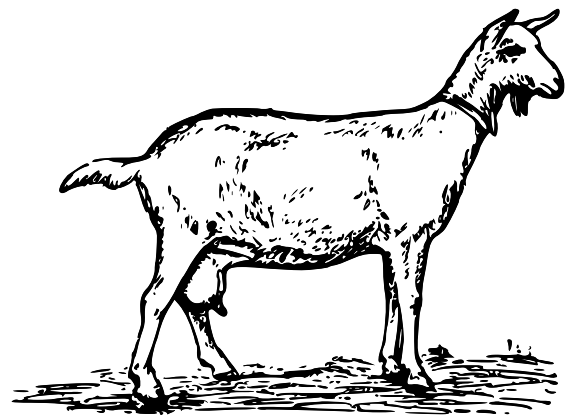
